2027 is an assessment year for Property Taxes... so?

The Assessment people at Manitoba Municipal and Northern Affairs are tasked with keeping assessments as close as possible to current market value. They get as close as two years previous, there's always a short lag time to figure it all out. When they're done, the playing field is as level as possible. If you have improved your property, or are in a rising market, your taxes will rise. If nothing has changed, you'll probably decline a bit. In Carberry, 863 properties were assessed, 397 went up and 466 went down. If you question your assessment, you can contact an assessor at assessment@brandon.gov.mb.ca and find out why. He can help you present your case to the Board of Revision which will sit on October 13, 2026 at 5:30 p.m. in the Town Office.

This Month’s Council News
May 2026 Joint Councils' Meeting

Kelly Marnoch of Guild Insurance had prepared a proposal to insure the Carberry Plains Community Centre to compete with the coverage provided by the Western Financial Group for AMM. He offered detailed comparisons of the types of coverage that would be involved. He noted that though Town or RM staff and volunteers would be covered for injury and liability, users of the CPCC should get their own coverage and provide Joint Councils with a certificate that they are co-insured. If a change is decided on, the premiums can be pro-rated to the day the change takes effect; there is no time constraint. Marnoch was thanked for his proposal and the well-prepared comparisons of a very complicated coverage.

The next delegation was from the CNCL Fire Department, represented by Chief McCallum and a group of his officers. They were there to explain and defend their recommendation of the Pierce BX pumper in stock at Commercial Emergency Equipment Ltd. The price was competitive; the competitors would have to build their units from scratch which would take longer than the mandated retirement of the present unit it replaces; it can be driven by anyone with a class 4 license with air (which most of the firefighters have); the five-man cab would enable the firefighters arriving in it to start work at once safely; and the price guarantee had just been extended to the end of the week of the meeting. The Joint Councils passed a resolution approving the purchase, but each municipality had also to pass a resolution before the guarantee deadline. Asked how to prepare for the next mandated equipment purchase, McCallum suggested that each municipality set aside \$25,000 each year, along with the \$25,000 that comes annually from the casino for fire coverage. This would put \$750,000 into the reserve, along with whatever will be left after this purchase and the \$300,000 the retiring unit will fetch.

A resolution upgrading the Fire Department’s wages was tabled to be discussed *in camera*.

The meeting accepted the offer of Philip Balabanski to supply a 2010 GMC Sierra for \$13,000. Half the cost will be borne by the Carberry Plains Cemetery, and the remaining half will be split evenly between Carberry and NCL.

Local Link Consulting had prepared an unofficial budget for work and acquisitions at the campground. This included hooking up the water, the washroom/shower/mechanical building, a cook shack, a tent for the maintenance compound, trees, seeding and irrigation, plus 8% for a consulting engineer. Somewhere near \$400,000 plus the 8%.

For the campground, Councils accepted the quote of Reilly’s Home Hardware for the supplies needed to install irrigation pipe to the campground and approved hiring Sandhills Electric to accomplish the installation.

They also approved the purchase of a container to house equipment at the site from Strongbox Containers of Neepawa.

For use as an office at the site, Councils approved the purchase of a 10’ x 24’ cabin from Premier Buildings in Glenboro.

To carry through the period until the washroom facility on site will be completed, Councils approved the rental of a two-stall portable washroom trailer from King’s Services of Winnipeg.

Appearing from Winnipeg by Microsoft Teams, Western Financial’s Kristin Keating and Charmaine Virtuuccio spoke about the insurance presently covering the CPCC, to compare with Guild’s offer. AMM’s plan does not require any co-insurance on the property; their limit of expenses and the liability limit are both five times as high. They also have a self-insurance component which regularly rebates when claims are below the maximum. CAO McConnell added that

the customer service she has received from Western has been exemplary. The meeting agreed to call Marnoch to see if they can make a comparison “apples to apples.”

The meeting accepted a quote from Back Road Transport to shift the pile of concrete and the burn pile with a bulldozer. A procedure for handling concrete including crushing and extracting the rebar should be developed to save space and money.

The Joint Foreman reports that indoor sports at the CPCC and baseball at the diamonds are under way, and the water is on at the Museum and Gingerbread House.

The Manager of Arts and Recreation is seeking details of improvements the clientele for her programs would like to see. She has summer programs for both young and old. She is organizing a Canada Day celebration at the pool.

A plaque commemorating the WWI ace and pioneering bush pilot Wop May will be dedicated on Sunday June 7, 2026 at 2:00 p.m. at his childhood home on Simcoe Street.

The new doctor assigned to Carberry will be welcomed for a visit with her husband and family on June 17.

The Fire Department’s level 1 and level 2 trainees will be given their practical tests on June 13 and 14. On June 20, they will host their annual Firefighters’ Texas Breakfast fundraiser at the Fire Hall.

The museum has completed its outdoor display building and is working to stock it with memorabilia from the early years of potato growing in Carberry. They intend to formally open the display during the Prairie Harvest Festival on August 22. Service for Seniors has set up a number of day trips throughout the summer and is working on grant applications. The handivans are running smoothly.

The Daycare’s subdivision has at last been approved. Public Works has visited the site to determine how the water and sewer will be connected to the building.

Reece Anderson sent a letter requesting that the Town and RM address the issue of litter escaping from the Transfer Station and blowing onto his adjacent land. He hopes to graze cattle on the land and is afraid for their health if something isn’t done. The Joint Foreman has offered to pull a crew of his staff from their regular duties to handle the problem in the shortest time.

Carberry Collegiate’s Youth in Philanthropy class are looking at presenting new benches for the ball diamonds, starting with the SE diamond.

The mayor is concerned with the increasing number of children seen on electric scooters without helmets. The devices can go quite quickly and have tiny wheels which can lose integrity and cause loss of control. Helmets should be mandatory; parents should insist. They protect against serious, even fatal injury.

June 2026 Town Council Meeting

Since the last meeting the Council held two special meetings, one to appoint a Weed Inspector, and one to commit to the purchase of the pumper required by the Fire Department.

From the meeting of the Joint Committee, a truck was purchased, the costs split between the cemetery board and the joint municipalities.

Several equipment purchases for the campground were approved — irrigation pipe, a storage container, a campground office, and a washroom trailer. Bulldozer work at the Transfer Station was approved.

Civic addresses were assigned for the lots in the Wells Subdivision on Kingsnorth Bay.

A policy for the collection of garbage and recycling was approved, which should reduce some of the confusion around glass recycling.

Youth Councilor Boganes gave the last report of his term of office.

The CAO commented on the civic addressing she developed with the ACAO and on the glass/waste pickup policy she reframed. She has been meeting with Public Works and the Fire Department to consider the staged expansion of the network of fire hydrants into the new lots in the west.

The U of M Rural Medical Week has passed, with four students coming to shadow the physicians at the hospital, and lots of other entertainment:

Applications to register as a candidate for mayor are now open, with applications for councilor to open on June 30. Any changes to the Voters’ List should be forwarded to the ACAO as elections officer.

Public Works built a fence at the north end daylily and dog park, and a road for the new Daycare. The work on the back lanes has been aided by the quality of the gravel provided by Mitchell; it packs much better.

With the assistance of many P&R staff and some volunteers, the field downwind of the Transfer Station has been cleaned up and can pasture cattle again.

Dr. Maharajh’s equipment is in place, waiting only on final inspection and certification.

This day was the start of the Farmers’ Markets, which will be held every *Tuesday* night from now until August 25.

Carla Dawn Smith has been hired as the interim office clerk.

July 2026 Town Council Meeting

A revision of the Traffic By-Law, which adds stop signs to the intersection of Wheatland Drive and Wellwood Road, was given first reading.

The week of September 21-27, 2026, was declared to be Rail Safety Week at the instigation of CN Rail.

Council approved a \$2 per capita grant to STARS Air Ambulance, who have been a lifesaving service to many members of our community.

The U of M Aggies’ Bedpush will be coming through Town on Friday, September 25 at around 3:20 p.m.

Council approved the assignment of ‘600 Wheatland Drive’ as the civic address of the new campground location.

Uses of the money that was once called the “Gas Tax” but is now the “Canada Community Building Fund” [CCBF] must be reported to the CCBF. Council accepted the 2025 Annual Expenditure Report as prepared by the Exchange Group.

Council approved the purchase of established trees for the cemetery from Koinonia Nursery. The costs are to be shared 50/50 with North Cypress-Langford.

Tenders were requested for the construction a walking path along Stickle Avenue from Dufferin Street to Main Street. The bid of Zenith Paving was accepted, on condition that it be completed before September 1, 2026.

Council will send the final payment of \$717,011.27 to Commercial Emergency Equipment for the new fire truck. The costs for this will be shared 50/50 with NCL. The machine isn’t yet in the Fire Hall; it has been delivered to the shop where it will receive its modifications.

Council agreed to approve sponsoring the Prairie Harvest Festival in the amount of \$500.

A new guestbook and its protective case are in place at the cemetery. Because of the weather, most of the plants had to be replaced. The ACAO sourced them from several greenhouses and wants to thank them for their help and generous deals for the replacements. The replanting involved the staff and a lot of volunteers without whom it couldn’t have been possible, and to whom thanks are due.

The new doctor, Dr. Hanan Almanama and her family were welcomed to town with a meal and a tour of the amenities, including registration of her children at the schools. A local realtor will help find a home here, and the children enjoyed a tour of the Fire Hall.

Applications for candidate registrations for Mayor and for Councilor are now being accepted.

At the Transfer Station there is a serious skunk problem. About 20 of them are infesting the place, which is difficult to deal with. To place the new Town dumpsters on the north side of the station, the compost pile will have to be moved, and the drainage of the site improved. The bulldozer that moved the cement pile can be called back.

Some monuments at the cemetery are leaning as the ground softens beneath them. The problem of lifting them while repair work is done is difficult for the taller old ones.

At the Museum, more old equipment is arriving to populate the display of early potato agriculture in the area. The display will be opened during the Prairie Harvest Festival.

The White House is in need of some repairs and/or cosmetic improvements. Skirting and insulating the foundation, plugging holes and covering vents would be good value for money spent, showing the Town is a conscientious landlord.

The Board of Revision date has been set for October 13, 2026.

Stride Credit Union will hold a Grand Opening of their building at 10 Main Street on Wednesday August 12. A community barbecue, a ribbon cutting ceremony, and tours of the new facility will be featured.

The Prairie Harvest Festival Committee’s Farmers’ Market is picking up speed after a slow start in June.

The campground should be open in a couple of weeks.

The mayor is dissatisfied with the performance of the Commissionaires. For the large cost of their contracted presence, no improvements are visible. He asked the CAO to investigate terminating the Commissionaires’ contract.

He also urged the Council to take seriously the decisions which are to be taken as their four-year term comes to an end. They will give shape to the community for years to come.
